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Beyond Height, Psychosocial Issues Are Also Factors That Affect Children With CPP



Nobody likes The Puberty Fairy.

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- Risks of earlier normal puberty^a:
 - More depression¹
 - More aggressiveness¹
 - More social withdrawal¹
 - Lower self-esteem¹
 - Poorer coping skills¹
 - Higher school absenteeism¹
 - Earlier psychosexual behavior²
 - Being bullied³

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Psychological, Psychosocial Issues and CPP

- Children with CPP are physically more mature than their peers, while cognitive, social, and emotional development tends to be consistent with age^{1,a}
- Family and social support have a major impact on mental health²
